

### Dear Residents.

We are pleased to announce that the "Chipper Crews" will return to Woodland Hills on Monday, May 19th, 2025, through Thursday, May 29th, 2025. Please have your piles stacked before May 19th.

You can visit the city's website for links to information on creating a defensible space around your home, <a href="https://www.woodlandhills-ut.gov/pages/public-safety">https://www.woodlandhills-ut.gov/pages/public-safety</a>, the State's web site (https://ffsl.utah.gov/fire/wildfire-community-preparedness/homeowner-education/), or feel free to email the Woodland Hills Fire Department at <a href="mailto:fire@woodlandhills-ut.gov">fire@woodlandhills-ut.gov</a>.

Also, a few items to follow to help our crews be more efficient:

- 1. When stacking trees and brush, ensure the large diameter end faces the street. If they are placed both ways, the piles are very hard to separate.
- 2.Stacks should be no higher than 3 feet tall and only one row deep.
- 3.No construction materials.
- 4.No stumps.
- 5.Once the chipping crew has passed your home, please do not place any additional material at the side of the road.
- 6.If you want to keep the chips, please lay a tarp on the ground next to the tree/brush pile near the edge of your property but not in roadside ditches. The tarp should be at the end of the pile in the direction of traffic flow so crews can pull past the pile. If a tarp is not down, the chips may be spread through the front part of the yard.
- 7. This is for mitigation and not to clear your lot.

We appreciate your support of this program. We are making a huge difference.

Please be aware of the following:

- ·None of your pile(s) should be on the pavement so vehicles can easily maneuver throughout the City.
- ·When chipping is complete, the lot/homeowners must clean up the chipped pile(s). Don't forget to clean your ditch and culvert of trash and debris.
- ·Your chipping pile needs to be stacked before the morning of Monday, May 19th since they'll only be making one pass through the city.

### Ted Talk - Community Fuel Reduction and Mitigation (Chipper Days)

Now that spring is upon us and yard work is on our minds, it's a good time to start planning mitigation projects and tree-clearing to help protect our homes. This year's chipper days will be from May 19th through May 29th. However, we ask all homeowners to have their trees by the roadside before May 19th, as the chipping crews will only pass by once. Additional information is included in this newsletter for stacking wood to make the most efficient use of the chipping crews. After the chipping has been completed, please help the City by clearing your ditches of any trash and debris. Each year we apply for grants to help with our city mitigation. The hours logged on the website go towards the City's match requirement for the grant. You can also log your hours for lot mitigation on the City's website (https://www.woodlandhills-ut.gov/pages/public-safety).

In addition to chipper days, we have a full-time wildland crew that responds nationally to wildfires. When they are not responding to wildfires, they work throughout the city, completing citywide mitigation projects. This crew is also available to residents for a free home assessment beginning approximately mid-April and can be hired to complete mitigation work for residents.

Community involvement in wildfire prevention yields profound long-term benefits, both immediate and enduring. A few of these benefits include:

·Mitigation efforts reduce the risk of property damage and loss of life during wildfires.

·Creating defensible spaces protects homes and neighborhoods from advancing flames.

·Long-term mitigation promotes coexistence with nature while minimizing risks.

Responsible land management helps maintain local ecosystems, ensuring healthier forests and wildlife habitats.

·Residents can enjoy the beauty of their surroundings while knowing they're creating a safer place to live.

We appreciate everyone's efforts and encourage all residents to continually evaluate and mitigate their properties.
