LONG-TERM PLANNING AND MAILBOX RELOCATION

Utah County is currently planning and designing the reconstruction of the roundabout at the city's entrance, which is scheduled for completion in 2026. The roundabout will be constructed for the current conditions. However, the required space for future expansion is being planned and acquired by the County. This expansion will be necessary to accommodate future growth in the surrounding communities and the expansion of both 11200 South and Woodland Hills Drive (going north from the roundabout) roadways.

Multiple cities are working, in conjunction with Utah County, on these ongoing long-term planning efforts. To facilitate this future expansion, which limits the current mailbox space, Woodland Hills City is evaluating the potential relocation of the community's mailboxes to the City Center. This concept is being discussed to improve safety, accessibility, and long-term functionality.

Under this long-range vision, the current mailbox location is being considered for potential repurposing as a future trailhead to support expanded trail connectivity, recreational access, and the preservation of open space for residents and visitors.

Please note:

- This is in the planning process.
- No final decisions have been made.
- Resident input will be an important part of the process.

The City Council and staff are committed to careful planning that balances practicality, community needs, and preservation of the character of Woodland Hills. Additional information and opportunities for public input will be shared as discussions continue. We appreciate the community's engagement as we plan responsibly for the future of our city.

We will be discussing this possible plan in our January 27th City Council Meeting. We encourage you to attend.

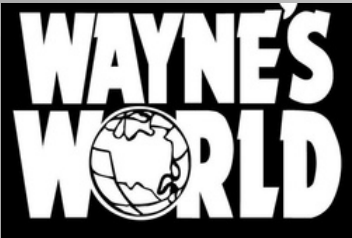

Many of you likely do not know that Wayne's World also encompasses Planning Commission activities, as I, along with others, serve on the city's planning commission. The city's planning commission is a state mandated commission that often functions behind the scenes in the way it serves a community. Some of it's responsibilities include reviewing and recommending lands use ordinances to the city council and holding public hearings on them. Recently, by State mandate, it has taken over the responsibility of approving new subdivisions in the city, formally the responsibility of the city council. Another State mandated charge is to update and recommend changes to the city council for the city's General Plan. A few words to those who may not be familiar with a city's General Plan. Simply, it is a public document updated every five years or so, which is approved by the city council, that gives direction to all parts of the city government, establishing goals and objectives, programs, legislative initiatives, etc., and identifying ways forward for the city to accomplish what it needs or wants to do. It is a "where do we want to go, and how do we get there", as a city. The State government requires each governmental entity in the State to go through this process every five years or so. Last year our city formed a committee to assist in this process and they have now provided a draft to the planning commission for review before going to the city council. This draft will be on the city's web page for any who care to read it. Following any changes which the planning commission may make to it, we will have a public hearing on the document before it goes to the city council for their review and approval. Similarly, the city council may make changes to it also before it is approved by them for the city to use. I welcome any thoughts that you may have about it or any of the topics it covers. TED TALKS

2025 YEAR IN REVIEW

Happy New Year! At the beginning of this new year, I would like to take a few minutes and provide an update on the major accomplishments of the Public Works and Fire and EMS Department through 2025 and mention a few of the plans for 2026.

PUBLIC WORKS

The major public works projects completed this past year in the community include:

Broadhollow Well Upgrade. The first is the completion of our well upgrade project. The most notable of the well improvements include adding 3-phase power, a backup generator, upgrading the well pump to produce an additional 300 gallons per minute, and better access to the well. These improvements help us to meet our growing demands and be better prepared in the event of an emergency.

Pavement Management. The second most notable improvement, and perhaps the more visible one, is the road improvement projects. In 2024, we completed a pavement management plan that helped us determine the condition of the roads, the best treatment for each road based on its condition, and the phasing to repair them. This past year, we were able to complete phases 1 and 2 of the three planned projects. These two phases completed approximately 11 miles, or 65% of our roads.

Stormwater. In 2024, a stormwater management plan was also completed to evaluate our city's stormwater drainage and potential flood areas. With this plan, projects were identified to help us better control and manage our stormwater runoff as growth continues. In 2025, we completed the first of these projects.

FIRE AND EMS DEPARTMENT

Volunteer EMS Insurance. In the 2025 legislative session, the State amended HB 298, expanding the opportunity for volunteer EMS personnel to qualify for the state health insurance program. This amendment allowed our city to qualify. We have historically operated under Salem's EMS license, but now we are getting close to obtaining our own license to qualify for the insurance program.

Certifications. In 2025, we had two personnel receive their structural firefighter certifications, and two more completed the certification schooling and are just waiting for the official certifications.

We also had three personnel receive their EMT certification. This brings our total fire and EMS volunteers to 22 people who contributed over 5,000 hours on calls, attending training, and receiving certifications.

Wildland Fire Program. Our seasonal wildland crew of 4 people was assigned to eight national fires this past year around the United States, generating a significant amount of revenue for the city.

While not on fires, they also completed over 500 hours of mitigation in our city.

2026 PLANS

Public Works. In 2026, some of the major plans include completing phase 3 of the roadway improvements project, planning and possibly starting construction of a new water tank to facilitate growth, preparing a plan and identifying funding options to replace approximately 5 miles of aged waterlines and roads on the northeast side of the city, complete another one or two stormwater management projects, and coordinate with the County to expand and reconstruct the roundabout.

Fire & EMS Department. Complete our EMS licensing, replace expired Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), update our Standard Operating Guidelines (SOG's), enhance our volunteer recruiting efforts, and continue and possibly expand our seasonal wildland firefighter program and equipment.

I'd like to personally thank our active and involved city council and our outgoing Mayor, Brent Winder, for their insights, support, and dedication to making this a better and safer community for all of us.
