COMMUNITY OF WOODLAND HILLS CITY REPORT

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The City will soon hold public hearings on multiple issues. Here's a rundown:

When are the hearings?

The Planning Commission with hold a hearing on May 19. The City Council will hear public comment on the same issues on May 25. Both of these meetings will be held via Zoom.

What issues are up for public comment?

To expedite the recent codification process, the City Council kept ordinances as identical as possible to the original code. Now that codification is finished, the city is proposing necessary changes. After public comment, the council will vote on these one by one. The upcoming hearings will address the following proposed changes:

Architectural and Landscaping Standards

At one time there was a city-wide homeowners association known as WHPOA (Woodland Hills Property Owners Association). Although this association is no longer active, its protective covenants still exist. The city proposes that some of these architectural and landscaping standards be codified so they become actual ordinances.

Fire Hydrant Requirements

This is a proposal from our fire chief about fire hydrant placement. It would align our code with the State Wildland Interface Ordinance.

Non-Motorized Trails and Walkways

The city's general plan contains a section on trails and walkways. This proposal would make those guidelines part of the city code. The guidelines define things like 1) the purpose, construction and maintenance of trails and walkways 2) what is permitted and restricted on them, and 3) penalties for violations. This has been a hot topic lately because of potential implications for the switchback trail.

Water Policies

When developers develop a property, they must acquire the accompanying water rights, then deed those rights to the city. This proposal gives requirements for that process. (These would also apply to residents who

subdivide their property.)

Time Limit for Appeals on Land Use

If individuals disagree with a land use decision made by the city (such as a zoning decision) they can file an appeal. This proposal sets a limit of ten days to appeal. This aligns with the Utah State code.

Accessory Outbuildings

This proposal defines configurations and setbacks for outbuildings such as sheds and detached garages. The requirements themselves are identical to the old code. This proposal just adds more city zones to the table of requirements. (See link below.)

Amendments to the 2021 Budget

This last item is not a code change, but it requires a public hearing. At the end of each fiscal year, the State requires cities to reconcile that year's budget and show how money was actually spent. Because funds are often shifted from one category to another to meet specific needs, an amended budget is drawn up to reflect those changes.
