City Government

- The Planning Commission and City Council are considering new zoning that would allow for the development of a retirement community.
- The City is working with landowners and developers to construct a new road from Thousand Oaks down to 11200 S. Most of the land needed for the road has already been acquired.
- The City is working to acquire additional land by the lower wells (East of the mailboxes) and considering building the salt storage facility there.
- The City welcomes back Corbett Stephens as our public works supervisor and building official.
- The Planning Commission recommended, and the City Council approved, the rezoning of the development formerly known as Woodland

Heights back to R-1-19 in preparation for a new development.

- The City is seeking additional water sources. Tuesday night a report was heard regarding the construction of an additional well east of the water tanks.
- Mayor Lauritzen was appointed to serve on the Strawberry Electric Service District Board.
- Bob Perry was appointed as City Flag Master.
- The City Council approved the disbursement of funds for activation of the fourth Community Notification Siren.
- The Mayor is looking for a couple of volunteers to serve on the Planning Commission.

The cities of Woodland Hills and Elk Ridge have seen an increase in the number of burglaries over the last month. These cases are being investigated by our detectives division and they are actively pursuing several leads. In most of the cases, homes were unoccupied with doors left unlocked. Please make it a habit to lock your doors and close garage doors. This will reduce your risk of becoming a victim of crime. In a few of these cases neighbors have reported seeing a suspicious vehicle after the fact. If you see a vehicle that doesn't belong on your street, or is acting suspicious please call and report it to Utah Valley dispatch at 801-794-3970 immediately. (For emergencies please dial 911.) If possible obtain a license plate number. Help protect your property and your neighbors property. Make your community as safe as possible by reporting all suspicious activity. If you are interested in becoming part of a neighborhood watch program please contact the city office. I have also placed a neighborhood watch pamphlet with more security tips for homeowners at the city office, please stop by and pick one up.

WHAT: Living Well classes for those with chronic conditions

DESCRIPTION: Would you like to better manage your chronic condition, decrease your pain, decrease your doctors' visits, and enjoy life more? The Utah County Health Department, Utah Arthritis Program, and Mountainlands Association is promoting "Living Well with Chronic Conditions," a six class self-management series. Class are tailored for individuals living with a chronic condition or for those who live with someone with a chronic condition, such as asthma, arthritis, fibromyalgia, cancer, heart disease, emphysema, depression or chronic pain. Subjects covered will include: techniques to combat frustration, fatigue, pain and isolation; appropriate exercise to maintain and improve strength; appropriate use of medications and proper nutrition; techniques to effectively communicate with family, friends, and health professional and guidelines to evaluate new treatments. WHAT: Family Planning and Well Child Check-ups:

DESCRIPTION: The Utah County Health Department provides basic, low cost clinic exams for well child, scouts, school, etc.. Initial exam, with a general physical, is provided by appointment at the Health and Justice Center (151 S. University Ave, Provo) for children up to age 18. Fluoride prescriptions are also provided. Family planning, including initial exam, pap smear, and birth control are available for women over 18 or teenagers when accompanied by an adult. WHAT: Prescription Take Back events, September 29th

BRIEF: On Saturday, September 29th from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Substance Misuse and Abuse Reduction Team (SMART) Coalition, local law enforcement, and other partners will give the public an opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by removing potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs from their home medicine cabinets. Free to the public, this event helps safely dispose of unused medications to prevent misuse and protect the environment. Medications will be collected at locations throughout the county, including:
